Treasurer's Report


In 2015, the Adult Literacy League was able to increase our Net Assets and also improve our year-end cash position over the previous year.

We were able to meet our budget target for revenue and to bring the organization in under budget on the expense side.



How Are We Funded?




Our Purpose & Mission

The Adult Literacy League serves to build a literate community.

We educate adults to become self-sufficient members of the community and advocate on behalf of adult and family literacy.

Adult Basic Education & GED

One of the biggest challenges for our Adult Basic Education Students is overcoming fear. Students are afraid to ask for help, they're afraid of ridicule and shame. They're often embarrassed because of a lack of literacy skills. In 2015, we helped our Adult Basic Education students in every aspect of the definition of literacy so they could read, write, communicate, compute, solve problems and use technology. In our GED Lab, we helped 16 students pass one or more sections of the GED. 11 of these students achieved their high school diploma and 100% of those students went on to post-secondary education!

English as a Second Language (ESOL)

Becoming literate in English is important to our students. In 2015, this was the largest of our program services and our students made significant gains by every measurement tool we use. We provide ESOL classes in Orange, Osceola and Seminole counties in libraries and with community partners. Our ESOL students also worked to develop their own learning opportunities with staff and volunteers, such as Health Literacy Project-Based Learning funded by Florida Blue and the Florida Literacy Coalition.

Family Literacy Services

Here is our Family Literacy Manager, Laura Fisher, with some of our youngest new readers. We are providing their parents with the training, support, books, and supplies to ensure these children at Hungerford VPK, and the 594 other families we served in 2015, have everything they need to support early literacy at home. The increased time spent by these children and their parents reading and learning at home is cause for celebration!



Our Literacy Report Card

We have documented 4,811 positive outcomes in 2015 which clearly demonstrates the effectiveness of our programs and the impact we have on individuals and the community.

Our students not only become more skilled and develop increased educational competencies, they become better workers, citizens and parents.

Increased Economic & Work Stability

403 students achieved work-based certification, applied for a job, left public assistance, opened a bank account, purchased insurance, improved employment situation, with 112 students obtaining full-time employment – 57 of them for the first time.

Increased Family Literacy Skills & Activities

1,432 students increased involvement in their child's education, read to a child, visited the library, acquired a library card, increased time spent in preliteracy or reading activities with children, increased involvement in their child's school and/or with the teachers.

Measurable Educational Gains

2,199 students increased test scores, completed a grade level, increased math, reading, language skills.
36 entered post-secondary education or training.
16 successfully passed all or part of the GED and
11 became high school graduates!

Increased Civic Engagement

522 students accessed community services, increased involvement in volunteer activities, obtained a driver's license, performed civic duties, voted, registered to vote and **23** became United States citizens.




